



**2024 Employee Housing Survey** 

## **Executive Summary**

In February 2024, the district invited all employees to participate in an anonymous survey and thought exchange regarding household income, commute time and cost of living. 1,443 employees responded, including teachers, food service workers, custodians, bus drivers and administrators.

66% of respondents identified themselves as cost-burdened, which the Department of Housing and Urban Development defines as those families "who pay more than 30% of their income for housing" and "may have difficulty affording necessities such as food, clothing, transportation, and medical care."

The majority of respondents believe that an increase in salary would be the most effective way to address the cost of living in Austin. Many also suggested the need for more affordable housing options, particularly for single-income families and middle-class families. Some respondents suggested specific resources such as loans, property tax relief, and better access to public transportation.



#### Q1: What is your current position at the district?



#### Q2: How many years have you been employed by the district?








#### Q4: Do your currently rent or own?



53.5% of respondents currently rent


# Q6: Do you sharing housing costs with family, spouse, partner or roommate?








# Q8: How many adults currently live in your household?



53.5% of respondents live in a 2-adult household


# **Q9:** How many dependents / children currently live in your household?

### Thought Exchange: What specific resources do you need that would help address cost of living in Austin? (Highest rated thoughts):

- 1. "Increase pay to accommodate the cost of living. Providing housing only increases long term costs to district. Provide pay raises to help offset the cost of living!"
- "Pay teachers and school employees a livable, professional wage. We live in one of the most expensive cities in Texas, yet we make less than many other districts' teachers."
- 3. "Salary increases. Austin has a high cost of living and teacher salaries have not kept up with the cost of living."
- 4. "Higher pay. Teachers are professionals. As a single person with a master's degree, I should be able to afford a one bedroom apartment in Austin."
- "A cost of living pay increase. We've received raises, but pay is still far below what's needed to afford housing in AISD. It's equitable for both renters and buyers."
