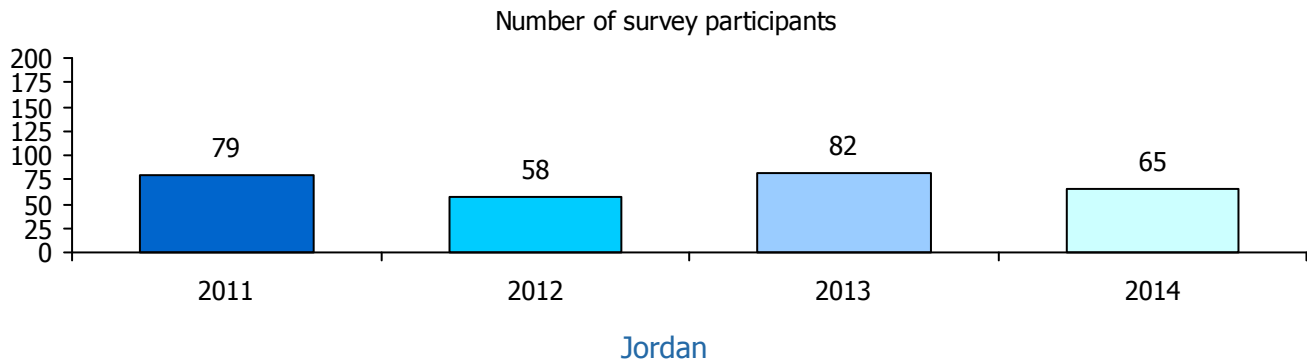


TELL AISD Staff Working Conditions Survey: Results for 2011 through 2014

Jordan Elementary School

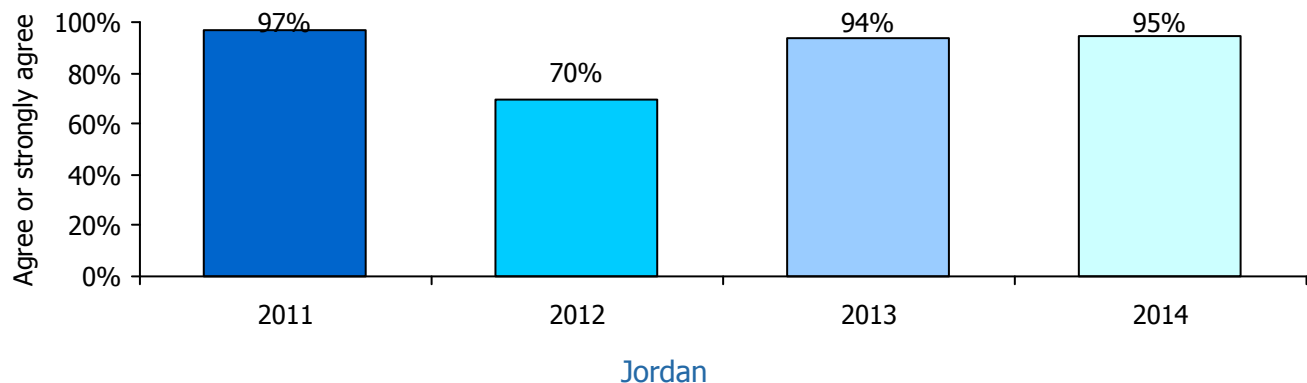
To do their jobs well, educators need supportive school environments where they are valued, are trusted, and can collaborate to improve instruction. The Teaching, Empowering, Leading and Learning (TELL) AISD Survey is a unique opportunity to gather information about school conditions from those whose views matter most—practicing educators. Respondents are asked for their perceptions on a variety of issues related to student achievement and staff retention, including Overall Climate, Use of Time, Leadership, Facilities and Resources, Student Behavior Management, Community Support, Professional Development, Instructional Practice, and Achievement Press. Participant counts for each year are displayed below.



Survey Results

For each item in this report, the number displayed represents the percentage of respondents who agreed or strongly agreed with the statement. Arrows indicate statistically meaningful changes from one year to the next, computed based on both the percent agreement from year to year and the number of respondents. Longitudinal data and average 2014 results for all schools at your level also are provided where available.

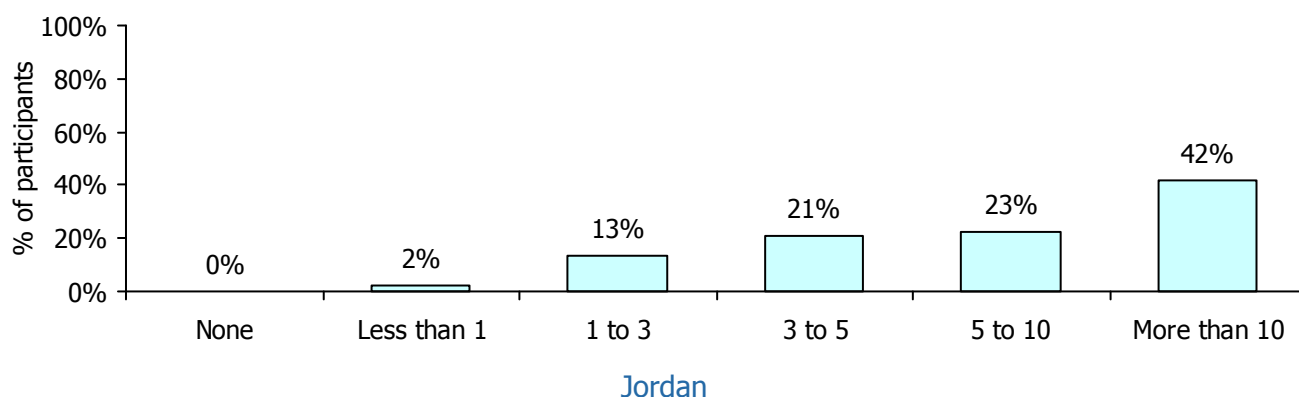
