RESULTS OF THE AISD HIGH SCHOOL EXIT SURVEY CLASS OF 2008

LASA HIGH SCHOOL

The sixth annual AISD High School Exit Survey was administered online¹ to seniors in every AISD High School during the Spring of 2008. This report contains the results for the LASA High School Class of 2008. Where available, longitudinal data are presented to compare with the current 2008 responses. In addition, average results from all AISD high schools are presented alongside results for LASA for comparison purposes. In total, 3,192 students in the Class of 2008 completed the survey, including 155 students from LASA. Longitudinal tests for statistical significance were conducted with district-level data (see district-level report).

Student responses are organized into seven general topics areas: Open-Ended Comments; Postsecondary Intentions and Family Support; High School Experiences, Campus Climate, and Civic Engagement; Instruction and Technology; Postsecondary Preparation and Advising; and Final Thoughts. Some of the notable trends at this campus include:

- Activity participation and employment. LASA seniors appeared to have higher levels of participation in music and environmental extracurriculars than AISD seniors as a whole. Fifty-three percent of LASA seniors report 'not working' during the school year in comparison to 36% of all seniors; however, LASA seniors worked at rates comparable to the rest of the district during the summer before their senior year.
- **Study time.** LASA seniors appeared to study more hours per week and to study with fewer distractions than other AISD seniors.
- **Postsecondary preparation and advising.** LASA seniors appeared to feel slightly less prepared for the college and financial aid application processes, but seemed to have taken more steps to apply for college than district seniors overall. Seniors appeared to have rated

the assistance received from campus staff (i.e., counselors, advisors, teachers) lower than that of parents/family, friends, and their own research.

INDIVIDUAL ITEM RESPONSES FOR LASA HIGH SCHOOL

OPEN ENDED COMMENTS

The first item on the survey is open-ended so that students have the opportunity to give feedback to district administrators before they have received any prompts or exposure to the broad themes within the survey. The responses below are to the question, "What is the ONE thing that you especially want the administration of AISD to know?"

One hundred and twenty-six LASA students (83%) provided a response³. Comments mostly focused on scheduling, TAKS testing, and the split between LASA and LBJ high schools. LASA seniors reported that the long school day plus the amount of their homework decreased their time spent preparing for college. Most students said studying for the TAKS distracted them from their class work and they disliked the division between LASA and LBJ. Commonly identified themes expressed by the Class of 2008 include:

- Scheduling. Many students talked about the problems they experienced because of schedule changes. "During the year there were many disorganizations that I have noticed and they have cost time. For example, "C" days on Mondays really do not accomplish that much because time is constricted in all 8 classes;" "You really made it harder on us by making the school year end later because we have less time to prepare for AP Tests;" and "LASA should get a shorter school day or at least less homework." Some students mentioned final exemptions should be restored. "Taking away final exemptions was probably the worst decision I feel that this administration made. We work hard all year for the grades we receive and felt it was a snub of sorts to have not be rewarded any more for our hard work. It made us feel less motivated." and "Students, even seniors, need to be able to exempt from finals somehow. Whether through AP testing or some other path, final exam exemptions need to be available."
- TAKS testing. Students reported the benchmark and TAKS tests were unnecessary. "The TAKS benchmark tests take away time that we could be learning in class. I feel that I lost days of valuable information because I was forced to bubble in answers of information that I learned in elementary school." Another student said, "The TAKS test is a complete waste of time, and the only thing worse is when people 'teach to the test'."
- LASA and LBJ. The split between LASA and LBJ seemed to create tension among the students. "The split between LBJ and LASA needs to be evaluated; if it is helping LBJ that is wonderful but otherwise it is making for an odd dynamic in our school." "The schools motto "Two schools one goal" is frighteningly reminiscent to the 60's concerning civil right 'separate but equal';" and "If there are going to be two schools with two different cultures there should be different buildings to avoid tension between students and staff."

Figure 1. To What Extent Do Your Parents / Family Support Your Plans for After High School? (Item 11)









Figure 4. On Average, What Percentage of Your Study, Research and Homework Was Done Without Distractions (e.g., Television, Music, IM, Texting, Phone Calls, etc.)? (Item 24)





Figure 7. How Helpful Was Your Project ADVANCE Facilitator/College Advisor With the Following Processes? (Item 38)





Figure 8. How Helpful Was Your Advocate/Advisory Teacher in the Following Types of Meetings? (Item 40)

Figure 9. How Helpful Was Your School Counselor in the Following Types of Meetings? (Item 41)







