2016 SAT Test Results Summary

Austin Independent School District

Purpose


This report describes SAT test results for AISD's graduating seniors, Class of 2016, who took the SAT any time during high school, prior to March 2016 and the implementation of the new SAT test. The older version of the SAT measured critical reading, mathematical reasoning, and writing skills, and the score range was 200 to 800 points for each of the three subtests. A perfect SAT score was 2400.


The College Board administered the redesigned SAT in March 2016 for the first time. While most of AISD's Class of 2016 took only the pre-March 2016 SAT, a small percentage took the new SAT. Results for the new SAT were not available at the time of this report and will be reported at a later date.

How many AISD students took the SAT?

AISD students' participation in SAT testing continued to increase in 2016, compared with participation in prior years. SAT test participation for students identifying themselves as Hispanic or White increased, while SAT test participation declined for Asian and African American students (Figures 1 and 2).

AISD SAT test participation has increased since 2006.






How did AISD students perform on the SAT?


The district's average SAT composite score of 1498 exceeded the state (1393) and the national (1484) averages (Figure 3). The district's average SAT composite scores slightly decreased from 2015 (1507), as did the average SAT composite scores at the state and national levels.

The district's average SAT composite score exceeded the state and the national averages for the past 4 years.





In 2016, the average reading and math scores for AISD students exceeded state and national average scores in those subjects. In writing, district and national average SAT scores were similar and were greater than the state's average in 2016.



AISD SAT composite scores by ethnicity remained relatively stable over the past five years with gaps in SAT performance remaining between groups (Figures 7). However, students categorized as African American slightly increased their SAT scores in 2015—2016 compared with their average scores in the prior year. Students categorized as Asian, White, or Hispanic, slightly decreased their scores in 2015—2016 compared with their average scores in the prior year. Scores for students categorized as two or more races were reported for the first time in 2015—2016.

Gaps in AISD students' SAT performance remain between White and Asian students and those who were African American, Hispanic, and of two or more races.



Compared with student groups at the state and national levels, AISD students outperformed their peers in the same race/ethnicity groups with exception of Hispanic students. AISD Hispanic students had slightly lower composite scores than did Hispanic students across the nation (Figure 8).

With the exception of Hispanic students, AISD students in each race/ethnicity group had greater average SAT composite scores, compared with their peers at the state and national levels in 2015—2016.

How did students perform on the SAT across high schools?

Similar to prior years, the average SAT composite scores continued to vary across high school campuses in 2015–2016 (Table 2). Average SAT composite scores in 2015–2016 ranged between 1971 at the district's Liberal Arts and Science Academy (LASA) and 1158 at Lyndon B Johnson (LBJ). Ten high schools decreased and four increased slightly in their overall scores.
